OZZIE OSSENKOP

Celebrating 100 years of Greatness...Great Talent... Great Leadership...Great Legacy

Join us as we pay special tribute to A.C. "Ozzie" Ossenkop during this year's CHHS's Hall of Fame Association Luncheon. Mr. Ossenkop, who received the CHHS Hall of Fame President's Award in 2005, would have celebrated his 100th birthday this year.

Ozzie was loved and respected by his family, friends, and students in choirs he directed at CHHS from 1950 to 1972 and as Minister of Music at Asbury, Capitol Hill and Village United Methodist Churches. He was known for his many talents, including drama, singing, teaching, and mentoring. He served in the Navy during WWII, completed his Master's Degree at Northwestern University, received letters of recognition from President George H.W. Bush and Governor Henry Bellman.

In 1961 he was the only high school choral director in the United States to become a charter member of the American Choral Directors Association and was also elected to Who's Who of Choral Directors in America that same year. Ozzie became the first Director of Community Development at the Oklahoma City Community College in 1972.

Ozzie's Concert Choirs won 16 state championships, performed across the U.S. and Canada, and for 12 years opened the joint sessions of the Oklahoma State Legislature. In 1961 they sang at the National Music Convention in New Mexico, in 1965 at the World's Fair in New York and at the United States Capitol, performed at Expo '67 in Montreal, Canada, and in 1968 at the Hemisphere in San Antonio.

Wanda Jackson (1955) got her music career started with Ozzie's assistance. William Johns (1954) and Chris Merritt (1971) both operatic tenors, sang in Ozzie's choirs and with his help went on to sing at the Metropolitan Opera and across Europe. After the musical "Carousel" was released, the choir sang "You'll Never Walk Alone" at every graduation and the Alumni Choir continues that tradition at the Hall of Fame Luncheons.

We would like to thank each of Ozzie's former students who have joined Ozzie's CHHS Alumni Choir, under the leadership of Randy Parsons, for performing for us today.

2022 Humanitarian Award

Judy (Cooper) Blaine 1961



While at CHHS, Judy was Miss Chieftain, a cheerleader for 2 years and All-School cheerleader her senior year. She was voted best KiYi pledge, lettered in swimming for 2 years, was an "O" Club member for 3 years, on the Pep Council for 3 years, and was Miss Howdy. She also served as the CHHS representative as Junior Home Demonstration Agent for the State of Oklahoma. AND she was chosen as the CHHS representative to greet Vice President Lyndon Johnson on his visit to Oklahoma.

After being a very active student at CHHS, Judy began a 27-year career for the Department of Defense, first employed by the Oklahoma Air National Guard as the Tinker Base Commander's Administrative Assistant.

After transitioning to Tinker Air Force Base her favorite position was serving as Quality Inspector for the B-52 aircraft.

During her 27-year career:

She developed a training course for new engineers and scientists at Tinker.

She developed an intensive 3-week leadership course for potential DOD managers which was taught for the 18 years that the Department of Defense used her company based on her extensive military employment.

She taught classes at national conferences for The Federally Employed Women in D.C., Indiana, Texas, and Oklahoma.

She helped manage the TAFB Christmas Project. This effort involved a year-round fundraising effort. Hundreds of children were provided with clothing, toys and food.

Judy received several awards which included the Cadre of Employees for the Department of Defense.

After receiving a Master's Degree, she formed her own company, The Human Connection. This company was developed to help individuals become more successful in their personal and business lives. This involved consulting with clients to design courses pertinent to the employees, developing training manuals, publishing the manuals, and then instructing the class.

Throughout the 18 years of operating her company, hundreds of students were trained. A large variety of companies used her training classes, including General Motors, banks, hospitals, and tech centers.

Judy and a dear friend developed a Repair of the Heart seminar, a variety of 2-day courses to help individuals share information and to encourage and support themselves and the people in their lives.

She's been invited to be the motivational speaker for multiple organizations. She has taught life skills to Girl Scouts of America and other organizations. She serves as a sponsor for Future Homemakers of America. She has served as a volunteer judge for 4-H events.

Judy has tutored students who needed special presentation skills such as valedictorian speeches, public speaking, job interviews, and meeting boards for entrance into special career fields. She has worked with individuals transitioning from the welfare system to self sufficiency.

Throughout her life Judy has used her time and her talents helping others achieve goals and improve their capabilities. A determined woman, Judy's work ethic has helped her achieve many personal goals during her very busy life while she worked full time, raised a family and continued her education.

Today, she's a member of the CHHS Kiwanis Club, a sponsor for Future Homemakers of America, and is active in several on-going projects at the school. She is currently serving on the Board of the CHHS Alumni Association. She's also the Scholarship representative for our high school and also for her Purcell Ladies Golf Association. She's also a member of Central Oklahoma Women's Golf Association and the Oklahoma Women's Golf Association.

2022 Lifetime Achievement Award

Robert D. Dennis 1962



While at CHHS, Robert played on the football team for four years and was a member of the Economics Club, Key Club, and Ozzie's Choir. After high school Robert continued his education and began his lifetime in the military and in the court rooms.

He applied for and was accepted into the Oklahoma University School of Law starting in the fall of 1968. However, he had to withdraw his application due to his obligation for military service during the Vietnam War. He joined the Oklahoma Army National Guard as a private in the infantry unit. He later transferred to the Air National Guard and attended U.S. Navigator's school in California. He received a direct commission as an officer.

He served as a crew member with the Air National Guard and flew aboard a C-124 Globemaster (Old Shaky) to all corners of the world, including service in Vietnam, receiving the Vietnam Service Medal and Vietnam Campaign Medals. He later transferred to the Air Force Reserve and became a Special Agent with the Air Force Office of Special Investigations and served as a Reserve OSI Detachment Commander at Tinker AFB, Oklahoma. He retired as a Lt. Colonel from the military reserves in 1995 after serving more than 27 years.

After receiving his Bachelor's degree in Forestry, he attended OCU Law School night classes while working full time as a Courtroom Deputy for a State District Judge. During his last year of law school he was a legal intern with the Oklahoma Attorney General's office and earned his Juris Doctorate degree in 1973.

During this time he recruited, counseled, evaluated and advised young men and women about admission to the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, and was selected as the District Liaison Officer of the year.

For many years Robert served on U.S. Senator Don Nickles' Military Academy Selection Board, helping select the senator's selection to a military academy. He retired as a Lieutenant

Colonel in 1995 after 28 years in the Air Force Reserves and Oklahoma National Guard.

His civil career includes Assistant General Counsel for the Oklahoma Highway Patrol, District Counsel at the Small Business Administration, Assistant US Attorney for the Western District of Oklahoma, and the US District Court Clerk for the Western District of Oklahoma. He retired from civil service in 2014 after 42 years of government service. He has served as President of the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Federal Bar Association, was recognized as the Outstanding Attorney of the Year by the Central Bar Association of Legal Assistants, and served as Court Administration Specialist for the Supreme Court of Indonesia.

While serving as U.S. District Court Clerk, on April 19, 1995, he was in a meeting with personnel from the U.S. General Services Administration on the first floor of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. After the meeting, he and GSA State Director Don Rogers were in the lobby elevator when the massive bomb exploded in front of the building causing terrible destruction and damage. Barely able to see or breathe due to the heavy smoke and dust, he located the man he was with before the blast, and they began to crawl together out of the rubble. Despite personal injury, falling objects, collapsing walls, and exposed electric wires, Robert heard others cry for help and located two injured survivors and helped them to safety and administered first aid to other victims before seeking aid for himself.

Due to his actions following the Oklahoma City bombing, he was awarded the Director's Award for Outstanding Leadership by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts. At the direction of the President of the United States, he received the Airman's Medal from the U.S. Air Force for his courage and heroism during the bombing.

On November 22, 2010, the Governor of Oklahoma declared "Robert D. Dennis Day" honoring Robert's dedication to public service and for bravery and leadership during the bombing.

Robert Dennis exemplifies the spirit and hard work of graduates of Capitol Hill High School, deserving this honor today.

2022 Lifetime Achievement Award

Barbara (Cebulesky) Blanton 1964



From early childhood Barbara wanted to teach. Her grandmother was a teacher in one-room schoolhouses with a friend who also taught. That friend gave Barbara her discarded textbooks. So Barbara created a “classroom” in her bedroom and used her dolls and toys as her students. She was determined that her “students” would learn!

While at CHHS, Barbara was chaplain of the Student Council and Ki Yi Pep Club, the pianist for Morning Inspiration, was a member of the Latin Club and Economics Club, and played tennis in the Girls “O” Club.

She received scholarships from Oklahoma College for Women and from the Masonic organization which resulted in her Bachelor of Science degree, majoring in elementary education, and a Master of Education with a major in special education in learning disabilities, with a 3.3 grade point average for the four years.

This was the beginning of her life-long service in educating children and adults, while continuing her own education at OBU, CSU, and OCCC. After attending several real estate schools, she earned her basic real estate license and a broker’s license.

Many of the special education kindergarten through fourth grade children she taught during her 31 years in education were diagnosed as autistic. A live rabbit, Bill Bunny, was a classroom pet for the children who fed and watered him, teaching the children to be responsible. Their once-a-month field trips included the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center and riding a city bus to a fast-food restaurant. They also met with the Governor of Oklahoma in his office. Some of the expenses were paid by small craft items the students created and sold.

She used her personal struggles with health issues as a lesson in persistence. Barbara feels a special kinship with them because of their struggles to overcome difficulties. “You’re smart. You can do this. You may have to do this a little bit differently than someone else, but you can do it. We go on and make the best of it.” I wanted to give them the tools for

discovering self-worth and respect. I wanted to introduce them to the marvelous and exciting world of learning. I wanted my students to be the very best in whatever endeavor they chose.”

2022 JW Mashburn Community Leadership Award

Mary Ruth (Scott) Barnes 1965



Mary Ruth was a leader at Jackson Junior High before entering CHHS. While at CHHS, Mary was involved in extra-curricular activities. Honor Society, Economics Club, Y-Teens President, Swimming Princess, Latin Club, Future Teachers of America, and Student Council. At both schools she was well liked by faculty and students. Her dedication to study was paramount in achieving her goals.

One of her high school friends describes Mary Ruth as “seeing the world with an inner beauty that shines through her art work: a love of the environment, animals and art that reflects both her Native history and her family’s Native history”. Another high school friend wrote “I love her

spirit, enthusiasm for life, and love of her family and friends. For her to want to preserve her rich heritage and history of her family in her book is priceless. She is an excellent artist, decorator, cook, writer and confidant.”

After high school, Mary Ruth earned her Bachelor’s degree, minoring in pre-law with high honors, then a Master’s in Education as a Reading Specialist, phonics -based program. After college she taught high school and college English, Art, and Computer Science for 14 years, sharing her knowledge and skills with future generations. She is a believer in life-long learning.

In 2017 Barnes’ art was selected for the registry of Native American Artists at the Heard Museum in Scottsdale, AZ. Mary Ruth is a member of the National Watercolor Society. Several of her short stories and watercolors are in issues of the *Journal of Chickasaw History and Culture*. She has received numerous Chickasaw Artist Awards in watercolor and pen and ink.

Her watercolors are on display at the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center, the Artesian Hotel in Davis, OK Welcome Center, and in the Capitol offices of the Chickasaw Nation in Oklahoma City.

In 2017 Barnes retired from a career as Director of Estate and Asset Services, State of Oklahoma, SW Missouri and Wichita, KS National Office of the Planned Giving Business Unit of the American Cancer Society where she helped raise more than \$35,000,000 for cancer research, receiving the Top Performer AND Top in the Nation awards. She also developed a planned giving territory producing \$2.5 million in annual bequests; developed Donor Relationships and stewardship for a company in three states; developed and managed a Moves Management program following strategic donor identification, cultivation, solicitation, fulfillment and stewardship; trained Directors in Colorado, Kansas, Texas and Arkansas to successfully achieve Moves Management strategies and goals.

She also served as Director of Development for the advancement office at East Central University in her hometown of Ada, and held responsibility for fundraising that resulted in one of the largest donations in the history of the school – more than \$8,000,000. “Her efforts in fundraising and her ability to reach out to others has made a big difference for the university and for cancer research.

As a published author her book *Flight of Little Bird*, is a story of her first American family based on accounts of real people and events from the days of Indian Territory. This book tells the story of her great-great-grandmother’s journey in Indian Territory, and her bravery in the face of heartbreak and misfortune. The book won an Oklahoma Gold Addy award for the cover design and the book trailer. Mary Ruth dedicated her book to her grandfather, Harry McSwain, “who taught me the quiet excitement for life and filled my soul with the Chi howa loa, ‘God’s fire’”.

Her outstanding work with the Chickasaw Nation through the years has resulted in several awards, including 2015 Dynamic Woman of the Year.

In 2022 she became a member of the Chickasaw Hall of Fame and was honored by Bill Anoatubby, Governor of the Chickasaw Nation, who commented “Perhaps even more impressive is her commitment to use her many talents to serve others. Her work in the community will have a positive impact for generations to come.”

She participates in numerous Ada community organizations: Ada Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Ada’s Business and Professional Women (where she was honored with Woman of the Year). She is a member of PEO, Kappa Kappa Gamma Alumni Association, is active in her church and philanthropic organizations. She is a wife, mother of two sons Wiley and Selby who both work for the Chickasaw Nation, and grandmother. In her leisure time she is an equestrian, and she and her husband Mike enjoy traveling together.

2022 President's Award

Angie (Hedges) Hendricks 1969



In 1970 Alice (Fallwell) Hedges, class of 1947, and Bentley Hedges, class of 1947, opened a travel business in Alice's mother's duplex on SW 29th & Shartel. By 1974, Bentley Hedges Travel expanded to three branches in the metro area. They would expand their business to nine offices in Oklahoma and Texas with over 50 employees.

Angie is their daughter who would also attend CHHS where she lettered in Synchronized Swimming and Varsity Cheerleading, having been a cheerleader for two years. She began her travel career stamping brochures. Her mother had told her "if you don't work, you don't eat." So Angie attended multiple travel-knowledge training

courses, including TWA, American Airlines, and many destination courses, working her way up the ladder. Her passion for travel resulted in her becoming General Manager of the 9 branches.

As a planning committee member for her ten-year CHHS high school reunion she re-connected with Roy Steve Hendricks (1969 grad) and they were shortly married. In addition to a husband, Angie received a wonderful daughter, Jenny, and would later have two additional beautiful girls, Stephanie and Audrey. Also, in 1979 Angie was promoted to Executive Vice President of the travel company that serves not only south Oklahoma City, but represents individuals and companies from across the country.

In 1992 Alice passed away, leaving her half of the company shares to Angie, making Angie her father's partner. In 1995 Bentley announced Angie would become the President and CEO of the travel agency and majority stock holder, making the company a Certified Woman-Owned Business. Angie has since continued to encourage her employees to continue learning the ever-changing travel industry to make their agency stand apart from the rest. The agency has won numerous awards from airlines, tour companies, National Trade Associations, Oklahoma publications, and political figures.

In assisting the CHHS Class of 1969 with local and destination class reunions, and has helped many, many other travelers over the years in scheduling corporate and government business trips, world travel, college away games, weddings, and vacations. This devotion to customer service has helped families create life-long memories
